7. Communications Committee

Lisa Guthrie presented a one-page report including:

- HOA Presentations have been completed for three Associations with two more scheduled over the next 30 days.
- BBIA Booth at Community Events for the Kite Festival and the Sandcastle/Rollback Weekend.

8. Finance Committee

Jonathan Mallahan presented a five-page report including:

- Birch Bay Real Estate Excise Tax Estimate
- Birch Bay State Shared Revenue Estimate

8. Special Guest – Bob Jean

Matt Berry introduced Bob Jean who has 35 years of experience in successfully assisting incorporations of five cities in Washington State and two that were not successful. He was the City Manager of two other newly incorporated cities from their inception.

Mr. Jean made some introductory remarks and advised that the three key reasons for incorporation were:

- Local control (elected City Council)
- Control of growth management that will occur in any event because of the UGA designation
- Improved Public Safety with shorter response times and more local officers

He also noted that the first five years of new cities were incremental in ramping up to provide services; for example, police services might start with just a few officers before growing to the desired level of perhaps 10 officers. The first six months will be critical and a new city should partner and contract for services (such as policing, public works, permitting) as it decides what levels of service residents want. Newly incorporated cities often have lower tax rates because older cities must carry "legacy" costs such as pensions and benefits for retired employees.

Mr. Jean answered questions from the audience:

- Do County roads within the new City limits become the responsibility of the new City.
- Could an HOA contract with the new City for road maintenance.
- How would a new City get financing in the transition period.
- How would a new City get a bank loan.
- Why do local cities currently have deficit finances.
- What is the difference between a "resort community" and a "regular" city.

Matt Berry and the audience thanked Bob Jean for his presentation and were able to talk to him after adjournment.
